## **Mission**

Protect children from abuse and neglect; to preserve families, whenever possible; and to assure permanency, that is, to provide permanent, safe homes for children either by assuring safety within the child's own family, or by finding an adoptive home or another permanent setting for those children who cannot be reunified with their family.

## **Legal Mandates**

Complies with the following state laws/regulations requiring that child abuse and neglect be investigated and safe permanent homes be secured for dependent children:

## CYF Overview

#### Calls Logged 2019

- 17,734 calls of suspected child abuse/neglect were received by CYF.
  - 45% (7,968) were screened out at intake.
  - 44% (7,851) were assigned to a caseworker for a full investigation.
    - o 20% of these (1,567) were accepted for child welfare services
  - 11% (1,897) were related to active cases.
     o 80% of these (1,511) were connected to open cases

#### **People Served**

- In CY 2019, 8,478 children and 12,786 adults received services.
- On July 7, 2020, 3,860 children in 1,807 families were receiving services. 1,547 of these children were in out-of-home placement. 1,430 were in foster care. About two-thirds of those in out-of-home placement were placed with kin.

### **Budget (FY 2019-20)**

\$307.4 million (18.02% county; 62.49% state, 18.02% federal and 0.55% other funds)

79.5% of the total budget is distributed to contracted agencies.
