Vision Statement

To create an accessible, culturally competent, integrated and comprehensive human services system that ensures individually tailored, seamless and holistic services to Allegheny County residents, in particular, the county's vulnerable populations.

- Individualized and designed to be respectful of the unique cultural characteristics of each individual and/or community.
- Integrated and offered through a team approach that recognizes the capacity of individuals and families to identify their own strengths, needs and goals; create relationships and natural supports; and take the steps necessary to accomplish these goals.

The Allegheny County Department of Human Services (DHS) is responsible for providing and administering publicly-funded human services to County residents.

DHS provides a wide range of services, including services for older adults; mental health servcies (including 24-hour crisis counseling); drug and alcohol services; child protective services; at-risk child development and education; emergency shelters and housing for the homeless; non-emergency medical transportation; and referrals for supports coordination for individuals with a dianosis of intellectual disability.

Integrated Programs within the **DHS Executive Office** and under the purview of Patricia Valentine, are responsible for offering a network of integrated programs and services primarily through the following offices:

- Area Agency on Aging (AAA)
- Office of Behavioral Heatlh (OBH)
- Office of Children, Youth and Families (CYF)
- Office of Community Services (OCS)
- Office of Intellectual Disability (OID)

DHS also has three support offices:

Office of Administration (OA) provides administrative support services for the entire DHS, including fiscal, human resources and management.

Office of Analytics, Technology and Planning (ATP) supports and conducts research to produce community-ready information about the work of DHS, oversees department IT needs and engages in planning for evidence-based services.

Office of Community Relations (OCR) is responsible for internal and external communications, including media relations, public events and education, and donations. OCR also handles consumer concerns/complaints through the Director's Action Line and DHS staff recruitment.
